

Giants World Series trophy headed for Reno

The San Francisco Giants World Series trophy is making it rounds, with a date set for Reno.

It will be on the UNR campus at Joe Crowley Student Union Ballroom, 1664 N. Virginia St. on March 8 from 5-7pm.

A Lake Tahoe date is yet to be announced, but is still listed as a destination on the baseball team's website.

Nevada start for Tour de California

The 2011 Amgen Tour of California might need to change its name because it is starting in Nevada this year.



South Lake Tahoe had been touted as the start city, but it was announced today the multi-day event is starting in Stateline.

Cyclists will start the race May 15 at MontBleu casino. The Stateline property along with Harveys is providing 1,848 rooms for free to staff and teams.

This is the first time Lake Tahoe has been part of the largest cycling event in North America.

On Day 1 riders will leave the casino, go past Edgewood Tahoe Golf Course around Heavenly Village, past the starting line again and onto Highway 50 for the 72 miles around the lake.

After passing Tahoe City for a second time, there's a short ascent to Dollar Point before turning left up Highway 267 to finish at Northstar-at-Tahoe after riding 119 miles with an elevation gain of 5,500 feet.

Day 2 is one of the longest stages – 133 miles. It goes from Squaw Valley at the Olympic rings on Highway 89 and ends in Sacramento. In between, riders will go through Truckee, along Donner Lake and down to Nevada City and Grass Valley.

Tour of California covers 800 miles.

Stages include:

- Stage 1: May 15 – South Lake Tahoe to Northstar-at-Tahoe
 - Stage 2: May 16 – Squaw Valley to Sacramento
 - Stage 3: May 17 – Auburn to Modesto
 - Stage 4: May 18 – Livermore to San Jose
 - Stage 5: May 19 – Seaside to Paso Robles
 - Stage 6: May 20 – Solvang Individual Time Trial
 - Stage 7: May 21 – Claremont to Mt. Baldy
 - Stage 8: May 22 – Santa Clarita to Thousand Oaks.
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Ganong 18th in super G, Miller finishes with one pole

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany -- Four-time World Champion Bode Miller of Franconia, N.H., produced a run in Wednesday's FIS Alpine World Ski Championship super G like only he can. Miller was leading by 0.29 before his right pole was ripped out of his hand on a gate. He then continued to build his lead to 0.93 before losing balance near the bottom and standing up into the finish.

"I wasn't out of the race when I hooked my arm. It was a matter of making it to the finish without a big mistake and I probably couldn't have avoided that mistake with a pole. I just need to hang on to all my equipment until I get to the finish," Miller said.

Miller ended the day 12th as 30 racers, including Ted Ligety of Park City failed to finish.

Tommy Ford of Bend, Ore., was 14th and Travis Ganong of Squaw Valley was 18th, with Italian Christof Innerhofer taming the unforgiving Kandahar track for victory.

"Anyone who's willing to throw down and risk it all is going to be successful on this course. We're all talented enough to be fast, it's just a matter of who's willing to risk it for the podium," Ganong said. "I wish I'd have gone after it a little more, but this is my first World Championships start. It feels good to know I still have the downhill to look forward to."

The American pika, a tiny rabbit-like resident of the Sierra Nevada, will get another shot at the state Endangered Species Act.

On Thursday, the state Fish and Game Commission ordered a review of the pika's status in response to a San Francisco Superior Court ruling that found the Department of Fish and Game failed to consider new information in a review completed last fall.

This came in response to a lawsuit filed by the Center for

Biological Diversity, which first petitioned the state to protect the pika in 2007.

Mancuso snags silver in super G on tough course

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany – Elisabeth Goergl makes sweet high speed turns as well as anyone, which she displayed in taking the World super G Championship at Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany this morning in opening the title meet before an enthusiastic crowd of spectators and a bright sunny day.

It is her first championship after gaining bronze medals at the 2009 title meet in combined and at last season's Olympics in downhill and GS. It is also her first win of the season, and it was a good time to pull that one out of the bag.

Picking up the silver with a run that seemed to get better as it progressed was the amazing Julia Mancuso, tacking one more batch of sand into cementing her reputation as a big event skier. The American title ace (three Olympic medals and now four World Championship medallions) displayed magnificent control over a difficult, dappled and icy Kandahar course to come with five hundredths of her first championship.

Even though it is bronze and not gold, expect a huge celebration throughout Garmisch with the epicenter on Wildenauer Strabe, the home base of Germany's great Maria Riesch. She skied immediately after Goergl and, like Mancuso, just missed the top prize finishing 0.21 of a second off the Austrian's time.

Young skiers made strong bids but could not manage the prize winning slots. Swiss Lara Gut finished fourth, Austrian Anna

Fenninger fifth and Italian World Jr. Champ Elena Curtoni sixth.

In seventh was defending all-world queen Lindsey Vonn, looking, perhaps, just a touch tentative after having railed on organizers the day before the event for offering a course too dangerous for female skiers. Though the course seemed ideally suited for her strength and tactical skill, Vonn did not attack as we have grown accustomed to seeing.

There were DNF's and it was a tough course, but the lion's share of those DNF's came from skiers starting outside the first seed.

Mancuso said her run definitely improved as she moved down course. "I didn't start off the greatest, but as I started to pick up momentum down the course I started to get a good feeling and started to ski better and better."

She said she thought she'd be lucky to get the bronze, so was more than pleased with silver. "Of course I wanted to do my best and get a medal, so I'm stoked."

"I'm still chasing the win," she said. "I'll just remember that I need those five hundredths. You have to have everything here."

Landscaping rebates offered by watershed council

The River Friendly Landscaping program operated by the Truckee River Watershed Council is offering free site evaluations and a \$400 rebate for improvements.

Andy Otto, program manager for the River Friendly Landscaping Program, said the three main problem areas on most properties are roof runoff, the type of plants being selected for landscaping, and driveways.

It takes only 1 inch of rain falling on a typical 1,500 square foot roof to generate approximately 1,000 gallons of runoff.

Native plants are critical.

Water that drains from driveways carries contaminants to the nearest river or stream.

The average yard costs \$400 to \$2,200 to retrofit depending on the size, according to Otto.
