The 6Star Roxy Chicken Jam slopestyle and halfpipe finals both went down Sunday under sunny skies at Mammoth Mountain in California.

The day began with slopestyle finals in the morning under the blazing California sunshine making the course a little bit slow, but the ladies powered through the slush and put on a great showing. The slopestyle course is larger than in years past and the riders were loving the setup that consisted of a 65-foot jump, 55-foot jump, a rail section, pole jam and finished with a 50-foot kicker. It was South Lake Tahoe rider, Jamie Anderson, who had the speed and style on the course and was able to throw down a run that included a backside 540,

switch backside 540 and a Cab 540 mute to take the top spot of the day.

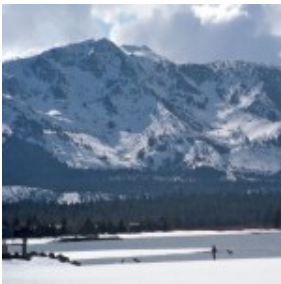

Blizzard warning issued for Lake Tahoe

A blizzard watch is in effect from Tuesday morning through that evening.

A cold front will pass through the Lake Tahoe Basin and Alpine County, according to the National Weather Service.

Expect southwest winds of 20 to 30mph, with gusts up to 50mph in the lower elevations and ridge gusts near 100mph. Winds may be combined with heavy snow to create blizzard conditions.

Snow accumulations of a foot or more above 7,000 feet and up

to 8 inches below 7000 feet are possible, with the largest amounts along and west of Highway 89.

There is a potential for snow combined with winds more than 35mph that may lower visibilities to less than one-quarter of a mile. Possible whiteout conditions could make travel dangerous, the Weather Service warns.

Locals dominate podium at Squaw in dual moguls

OLYMPIC VALLEY – It was the way Squaw was hoping to wrap up the weekend as hometown favorite Shelly Robertson (Reno, NV), along with Jeremy Cota (Steamboat Springs, CO), took the dual moguls titles during the Sprint U.S. Freestyle Championships Sunday.

“This is so awesome being at Squaw in front of all my friends and family,” Robertson said. “I’m so excited to win today. This is where it all started for me on this run right here when I was 15. It feels good to finish on this run on top.”

Robertson was joined on the podium by Eliza Outtrim (Steamboat Springs, CO), who marked her second silver of the weekend, and Heather McPhie (Bozeman, MT) who was pulling in another third for the event.

According to Robertson, her fourth U.S. title came with a little luck and some hard-fought skiing throughout the bright day in Tahoe.

“I felt like I got a little lucky on a couple of the runs

before, and I wasn't skiing on my game. I knew I'd have to put it together on this last run," Robertson said. "I was happy to finally put down the run that I wanted to ski on this last one."

After a weekend riddled with successes, Outtrim is looking back on what she feels are two weeks that can push her forward.

"It's incredible. I've probably had my best three results I've ever had in the last week and a half," Outtrim said. "They're my first podiums at U.S. Champs and to get two seconds is pretty sweet."

Absent from the competition, but there watching with friends and family was local hero and Olympic bronze medalist Shannon Bahrke (Tahoe City, CA) who was not racing due to an injury.

On the men's side, reeling in his first U.S. title had Cota very excited that he could go up against some of the sport's best and succeed.

"This is my first time winning a national title and I'm definitely psyched," Cota said. "There's a lot of incredible skiers in this event and for me to win I had to do my very best, and I was happy to be able to do that."

Also on the podium with Cota, marking his second appearance in the week was U.S. moguls champion Joey Discoe (Telluride, CO) in second, and Dave DiGravio (Farmington, ME) in third.
