

Tahoe's talk of Vancouver, Jan. 25 am edition

WHISTLER, British Columbia – Today was supposed to be our day to check out Cypress Mountain. Mother Nature said no.

This is because rain had been falling earlier this month on the mountain that will host the aerials, moguls, parallel giant slalom, halfpipe and skiercross events during the Vancouver Olympics next month.

The mountain was closed Jan. 13 after warm weather followed the rain.

Facing a ticking clock, Vancouver Olympic officials quickly swooped in to take over the mountain, politely excusing the ski area staff. The Olympic staff had no comments to or suggestions for viewing options for *Lake Tahoe News*.

Ironically, the condition quandary comes after Whistler-Blackcomb boasted record snowfall more than a month ago.

As for Cypress, bulldozers and other heavy equipment were called in to ensure what snow would get moved to the locations of the venues. This will be Grand Central for the likes of South Lake Tahoe's Hannah Teter who grew up in Vermont and should have no problem with what they call hard pack here in Canada.

Enough snow remains on top of the mountain to be able to be moved by helicopter or snowcat to the venues for the Games, according to officials.

The resort does have snowmaking, with a reservoir with 5 million gallons of water. Since November, the state-of-the-art snowmaking system has used 35 guns to convert 21 million gallons into snow to create the necessary features.

Officials are using wood and straw on some of the terrain and then covering it with snow.

The closure is to preserve what snow is there.

Cypress is at a lower elevation than Whistler-Blackcomb. It is between Whistler and Vancouver.

WHISTLER, British Columbia – People used to ski Whistler or Blackcomb, but seldom both in the same day. This is because it required a bus to get between the two resorts.



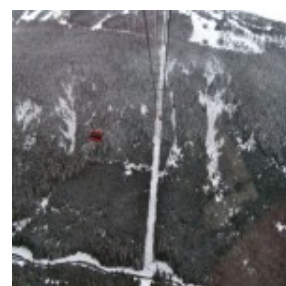
All of that changed on Dec. 12, 2008, when the 52 million Canadian dollar Peak2Peak Gondola opened.

Taking it across on Saturday I was a shutterbug. Today's trip back from Whistler to Blackcomb the nearly full car was rather subdued. Apparently we had all skied rather hard and just took in the beauty without conversation or need to photograph it.

This is the quietest gondola I have been in “ and most comfortable. The cushy seats accommodate 22 people. There’s room for six more to stand.

In 11 minutes riders are transported the 2.73 miles from one mountain to the other.

In this relatively short time span people are 1,427 feet above Fitzsimmons Creek at the high point.

The creek has the hydrological plat that provides enough power for Whistler-Blackcomb’s operations.

Twenty-eight cabins can haul 2,050 people per hour each way. Two of the cars have glass bottoms. Those are the silver cars, in case you want to wait for one.

“The 3S ropeway is a new configuration of passenger ropeway to North America but there are four others in the world like it. The 3S stands for three ropes – two track ropes and one haul rope pulling in the middle. The 3S design incorporates reversible tramway technology with detachable grip technology in a new and novel configuration,” the gondola’s website

says.

It has the longest unsupported span in the world at 1.88 miles.

What astounded me were the tracks on both mountains under the gondola. One passenger said how he and a buddy did the Blackcomb side over New Year's weekend. I just shook my head. Not a chance these legs will experience that.

Rah̃lves fourth at Lake Placid

LAKE PLACID -" It was a great Olympic sendoff for Daron Rahlves (Sugar Bowl, CA) as the X Games gold medalist finished fourth in the Nature Valley Freestyle Cup Sunday, the last skiercross World Cup before the 2010 Games.

"It was nice to make the final. I had some good heats. It was a great track with a lot of good opportunity," Rahlves said.

Rahlves took the lead and finished first in the semifinal run, which he said was a boost to him heading in to the last round.

"For most of the day I got in a good position to make good moves," Rahlves said. "It gave me confidence in the semifinal to get that draft in the straightaway and keep the rhythm on the terrain."

According to Rahlves, while he was happy with the finish, a better gate choice in the final could have landed him on the podium.

"Unfortunately in the final I was in the last gate choice on the end and there was a little bit of a kicker and I lost a little bit of ground out of the start," Rahlves said. "In the first turn I had some line taken away and was on the outside. I got trapped. I went down on my hand, but in the first and second turn you have to keep up your speed. I lost ground there"

But, in all, Rahlves was satisfied with the day, and hopefully some reflection on the races he can better himself in Vancouver.

"It's great being in the final but fourth place is not a great place to be. But I didn't crash and there was some good racing today," Rahlves said. "In retrospect I could have slowed down a little bit, taken an inside line and paced it a little more."

Canadian Chris Delbosco won, followed by Andreas Matt of Austria in second and David Duncan of Canada in third.

In the women's race Kelsey Serwa of Canada took the win, followed in second by Fanny Smith of Canada and Ophellie David of France in third.

It was a hot finish for Langely McNeal (Ketchum, ID) who landed in 16th to mark her career best ski cross World Cup finish.

The skiercross athletes now break from competition before the Olympics. The 2010 Olympic Freestyle Team will be announced Jan. 26.

Daron Rah̃lves of Sugar Bowl was sixth out of 60 competitors at Saturday's World Cup skiercross at Whiteface Mountain, N.Y.

Michael Schmid of Switzerland won the event.

The sport makes its Olympic debut in February in Vancouver.

DQ for Mancuso in Italy

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy — Lindsey Vonn (Vail, CO) continued to lead the Audi FIS Alpine World Cup after finishing 19th in giant slalom Sunday, the final chance for U.S. women to earn a ticket to the 2010 Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver. Teammate Megan McJames (Park City, UT) was also in the points in 21st,

while Finland's Tanja Poutiainen claimed victory as first run leader Kathrin Zettel failed to finish.

Only Vonn and McJames made it to finals for the U.S. Ski Team, with McJames fighting her way in from bib 46. It was her second time in the points in a GS this season

"She laid down a pretty decent run, and then backed it up with very smart skiing on the second run," U.S. Women's Head Coach Jim Tracy said of McJames.

Vonn, one day after getting her 30th career victory and sixth straight downhill win dating back to last season's World Cup Finals now carries a 56 point overall lead into three connective speed races set for next weekend in St. Moritz, Switzerland.

"Her first run was a little bit on the conservative side, but she really attacked the second run and skied quite well," said U.S. Women's Head Coach Jim Tracy.

Tracy said course conditions were hampered by hardier, icier conditions at the bottom of the course, leaving skiers in a conundrum: Use the correct skis needed for man-made snow and risk sliding out later on the ice, or go with razor-sharp skis and struggle with the early portion of the race.

"We thought, after seeing five or six racers, it's very hard to recover with a tactical mistake on that ice," Tracy said. "We were prepared for it."

The U.S. Olympic Alpine Ski Team will be named Monday, with coaches likely making the tough decisions into the wee hours of the morning.

"It's going to be a long night for me," Tracy said.

Teter bound for Vancouver

PARK CITY – Scotty Lago (Seabrook, NH) rode his way onto his first Olympic Team with a huge first run Saturday night at Park City Mountain Resort, putting down a score of 48.00 to win the spot. Shaun White (Carlsbad, CA) delighted fans with a Vancouver-ready 49.50 and earning his second victory in two nights, while Kelly Clark (Mt. Snow, VT) matched that feat in the women's event.

One day after scoring a 49.00 and landing the first-ever competition double McTwist 12, White was rewarded with a Grand Prix record 49.50 for stomping the same run and used his victory lap to high five spectators in watching in the light snow alongside the 22-foot megapipe at the Sprint U.S. Snowboarding Grand Prix.



"For me tonight to put that run together was unreal," White said. "It felt great.

"I wanted to push the judges to boundaries that they can go to. I know they haven't handed out a full-on perfect score yet. I'll get them."

With pressure of Olympic qualification thick in the air, Lago gave the gold medalist a run for his money for a second straight competition.

"I'm still in shock right now," Lago said. "Obviously, it's been a huge goal of mine for the last couple seasons to make the team, and to realize that I just did it, so many things

are going through my head.”

The top three men and women from the Grand Prix, based on average of two best results, get a spot on the fourth-ever Olympic Team which will be formally named on Monday.

White led the men’s standings, followed by Lago and Louie Vito (Sandy, UT). Clark, the 2002 gold medalist, took the women’s title, followed by Gretchen Bleiler (Aspen, CO) and 2006 gold medalist Hannah Teter (South Lake Tahoe), who was second twice in Park City and plans to donate all of her earnings to charity.

The six were announced to the crowd at a concert following the Grand Prix finale, where “I Ride For Pearce” stickers were abundant in honor of Kevin Pearce (Norwich, VT), still recovering in a Salt Lake City hospital from a severe head injury sustained in training three weeks ago.

“It was a hard-fought battle, obviously, getting on this team, but I feel like the best of the best are sitting right here, and we’re going to go into Vancouver with the strongest team ever,” said U.S. Snowboarding Halfpipe Head Coach Mike Jankowski.

Like White, fellow Grand Prix points leader Clark did enough in her first run to take a pressure-free final jaunt. She went front-side air, back-side 5, front-side 9, backside 5 and front-side 7 to nab 7.

Fans can watch the Saturday’s finals today on NBC Sports at noon.

The team will travel to Aspen for X Games events before going to Vancouver. The full 2010 Olympic Snowboarding Team will be announced Monday.

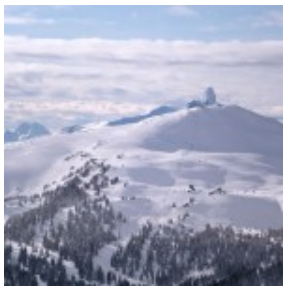
